Liability and Insurance Form

- 1. Entries shall be from members of Federation Societies/Clubs.
- 2. The organisation of the competitions shall be the responsibility of the Federation, held annually, displayed and judged at the exhibition.
- 3. As owner, the Federation will arrange the engraving of all trophies.
- 4. Competitive classes shall be as listed below. In each class, the first three shall receive a certificate and the winner may hold the trophy until the next competition. A winning entry from Class B, C, D, F or G shall not be submitted again in the same form and in the same class for a period of the following three years. Any doubts should be cleared with the Competition Secretary under Rule 10. Diplomas shall be awarded for entries reaching Standards I & 2 in Rule 8.

- Class A. The Somerset & Dorset Trophy. 16 Sheets

 Entrants must have won a Federation or Inter-Federation class or achieved
 a 75% certificate or won a national medal.
- Class B. The Mather Memorial Shield. 16 Sheets. General

 For all entries which are not straight postal history, airmail or thematic

 subjects. Cinderella material and postal stationery should be entered in
 this class.
- Class C. The K.J.A.O. Manning Trophy. 8 sheets. Postal History

 Material in used condition which tells the story of some aspect of postal services.

Class D. The Hossell Cup. 8 sheets. Thematic.

For entries on a theme developed on a logical plan by the use of appropriate philatelic material. The entry can be based on a creative theme (a freely chosen theme or idea) or on pre-existing themes —recurrent events, organisations or institutions. Non-philatelic material should not be included unless essential to the development of the theme. (see Note 8 "Thematic", especially).

Class E. The Junior Trophy. 8 sheets.

Restricted to persons under 18 years of age on June 1st of the year of competition. There is no restriction on the class of the entry but Juniors should try to follow the "Notes for Intending Exhibitors". The judges will take age into consideration. Members of "Stamp Active" within the Federation area may enter class E.

Class F. The Aerophilatelic Trophy. 8 sheets. Aerophilatelics.

Postal material concerned with the carriage of mail by air, used or unused, official and unofficial. Acceptable material includes stamps, aerograms, flown covers, airgraphs, etiquettes and, where they are subordinate to the philatelic material, photographs, press cuttings, etc. An entry may show airmail developments of a country, area, route, company or pilot. Souvenir covers are acceptable but commercial covers would carry more weight provided they have postmark evidence of the flight. Entries consisting of stamps illustrating aircraft. etc. should be entered in the thematic class.

Class G. The Postcard Class, 16 sheets, Postcards

A picture Postcard exhibit can have a geographical (topographical) treatment, including for example illustrations from a place or an area. It can also be developed thematically, or where the Picture Postcard illustrates a special event (e.g. Christmas and New Year cards).

Or a milieu (e.g. commerce, communication).

An event may be shown as a form of reportage, or may have the photographer, the artist or the printer as a topic. Original thinking and creativity may also lead to different treatments of the exhibit.

The illustration may be photographic, drawn, handmade or consist of appliqué work. An address is no indication that Picture Postcards have been treated by the mail. An added address is not acceptable.

A stamp or value hand stamp is not proof that a picture postcard has been through the mail. Other proof might show that the Picture Postcard has been through a postal service. An illustrated postal stationery item may be classified as a Picture Postcard.

If a Picture Postcard has been cancelled by the Post Office, it has been through the post, but if it does not have an address it has not been delivered, however, but it will be accepted in a Picture Postcard exhibit.

The franking does not need to be correct.

The material may be paper, birch bark, leather or very thin metal planes etc.

The thickness and weight of the Picture Postcard must be the reasonable stiffness not to be damaged through handling by the postal services. The format or size may vary.

- 5. If, after the Competition Secretary has drawn up a list of entries, a different entry is substituted, it will not be marked. If a judge of a class is an entrant in that class, his/her entry will not be marked. Entries voided for these or any other reasons may still be displayed.
- 6. Undesirable items. Entries containing stamps listed in Gibbons' Addendum will be heavily down-marked.
- 7. The Federation Committee will appoint a judge, preferably not a member of the Federation, who will be entirely responsible for the judging Class A, but will assist in the other classes and will confirm the markings for the 75% diplomas.
- 8. The Federation Committee will appoint two judges for each of the classes B, C, D, E, and F. They will divide the entries into.

 (1) Those above 75%. (2) Those in the range 60% to 74%. (3) Those below 60%. They will select the three best entries in each class in order of merit. They must consult the visiting judge regarding (I)
 - If the Competition Secretary considers an entry to be wrongly entered he/she may transfer it to the class to which, in his/her opinion, it is most suited.
 - The decision of the Competition Secretary will be final on all matters appertaining to the entries, except the actual judging.
 - Apart from the above, the nature and staging of the Exhibition shall be entirely a matter for the Host Society.

INSTRUCTIONS TO COMPETITORS

The entry must be the work and property of the competitor.

- 1. Each sheet of the entry shall be in transparent protectors not more than 9.6 inches wide and 11.2 inches high, with the order of mounting on the back. Pages of A4 size are not suitable for secure display frames, therefore are entirely at own risk.
- 2. Entry forms will be distributed through society secretaries and must be returned to the Competition Secretary by the specified date. A separate form is required for each entry. The Competition Secretary will send a form to every member who has entered during the last three years.
- 3. The actual entry should reach the Host Society custodian or Competition Secretary at least two days before the Exhibition.

Competitors will relieve the organisers of responsibility for insuring entries against loss or any other liability.

Failure to comply with these instructions may result in the entry being rejected or disqualified.

INSTRUCTIONS TO JUDGES

NOTES FOR THE INTENDED EXHIBITORS

Relative condition

The object of the Federation Competition is to encourage new exhibitors and help entrants improve their display. We hope that the following hints will be of assistance.

- You should demonstrate knowledge of your material, both by layout and by drawing attention to the more important details in the exhibit, and should avoid merely repeating catalogue particulars.
- o Dates and/or objects of issues should be given where applicable.
- Even with limited space, you should aim at showing a beginning, continuity and an end to your subject.
- Indifferent or bad condition should be avoided when it is known that it is not truly representative.
- Scarce or uncommon items can help in the continuity or the completeness of the story; they are only marked under this aspect.
- Writing up should be confined to essential information on your subject; catalogue data should be avoided. Do not use words such as "rare" etc.
- o Avoid overcrowding. You should aim at balance on your sheets and on the frames.
- o Word your entry clearly and concisely, starting the subject of your entry for the information of the viewers and judges.

In addition:

- Postal History An important cover may grace a page on its own. Cancellations should be on full cover, if not, do not repeat similar basic cancellations on pieces or loose adhesives.
- Thematic Study Rule 4, Class D, carefully. Introduce your theme, avoid embellishments and use only stamps or items showing the theme clearly. Pure subject entries (e.g. Roses or Birds) should not be submitted, but an entry considering say, the collection and development of roses by man and their evolvement into modern plants would be correct.

To summarise: read the rules carefully, read the basis of judging carefully, read these hints - remember all three. At the Competition, study all the exhibits. You will get ideas and see how others handle your problem.

WHY DIDN'T I WIN?

If you would like to know more about the Judges' reaction to your entry than is given on any certificate awarded (or not awarded), the place to hear it is front of your frame at the Competitions after the judging is over. The judges will be wearing identifying badges.

If you are unable to attend the Competitions, you may send a stamped addressed envelope to the Competition Secretary who will let you have a report of the total marks awarded and any significant inferences to be drawn from the mark sheets.
